


**NOVEMBER - 2020**



# **Nurturing Passionate Commitment**

A story from Duffy Robbins

I once attended a funeral in my home state of North Carolina. It had been a wonderful celebration of a life well lived. But now we were back at the church at a reception of sorts - an opportunity to meet family members and express our condolences. It was the first time I'd had an opportunity to speak privately that day with the elderly gentleman standing in the reception line, so I walked over and asked how he was doing. That's when, without ever making eye contact with me, he pulled a picture from his suit pocket. As we looked at it together, he began telling me a remarkable story.

The history of the old, wrinkled photograph went all the way back to World War II when the elderly gentleman was just a young Air Force lieutenant stationed near Tallahassee, Florida. One day on leave, he was walking around downtown when he saw two cute girls. Wanting to find a way to meet them, he came up with an elegantly simple plan. He had his camera, so he strolled over and politely asked the girls if they'd mind posing with him for a picture. They blushingly consented to the picture, and a passerby snapped the shot, a black-and-white photograph with him in uniform surrounded by two lovely ladies. And then, in a move I thought was kind of ingenious, he made this proposal: "Now, if you'll give me your name, address, and phone number, when I get this picture developed, I'll see that each of you gets a copy."



To make a long, wonderful, romantic story short, that's exactly what happened. But, to make the story even more intriguing, it turns out the two girls were sisters. And when the young lieutenant sent them a letter, along with two copies of the developed picture, only the younger sister wrote him back. But that was enough to spark a three-year courtship that led to a marriage that lasted more than 50 years. In fact, the funeral that day was for this woman he'd loved faithfully and passionately for more than half a century.

On their wedding day, neither of them could know, of course, what their life together might hold. Surely they never suspected that the last 10 years would be lived in the growing shadows of Alzheimer's disease - an illness that slowly and relentlessly led this pretty young woman into a dark tunnel of physical, mental, and emotional decay. But a vow is a vow. So in the later years of their union, as the mind and body of his bride faded into the shadows, this man continued to care for her, day in and day out, refusing to surrender their relationship to even the worst of a truly awful disease.

As I listened to this old guy tell his story, and as I watched him look at the faded photograph with such genuine appreciation, I was moved by his absolute devotion even after years of almost constant and complete care. Then it dawned on me: This is what it's like to live a life of profound, authentic passion. I was so struck by this that I risked asking what might have been an inappropriate question - especially under the circumstances.

I said, "Look, if this is too painful - you don't have to answer this question, but I really want to know. I'm a husband, and I want to love my wife like that, faithfully to the very end. How did you do it? How could you love so faithfully and so selflessly all those years?"

I'll never forget his answer. Still looking down at the picture with obvious affection, I could see his eyes start to tear up, and then he said, "She gave me so much joy and so much love, it was never anything but a privilege to love her back."

As we consider what it means to be a disciple of Christ and as we reflect on His profound love for us, let us look to this story to see what the vow of lifelong, wholehearted passion really looks like. Yes, this is a love that invites and enables and involves and enacts, but most of all, at the heart of discipleship is a love that endures.
